The Pink Ribbon, founded in 1998, was created to bring comfort to women who have been diagnosed with cancer. Proceeds from the Pink Ribbon luncheon and supper help support the Pink Ribbon comfort bags, the Coastal Care Van, and the Healing Arts Network.

The Pink Ribbon bags were created to bring comfort to women dealing with breast cancer. The bags are delivered to area physicians, who give them to their patients as they begin their healing journey. More than 1,800 bags have been distributed.

The New Hanover Regional Medical Center's Coastal Care Van is a mobile health clinic. It includes a mammography unit that provides breast, cervical, and prostate screenings throughout the region.

The Healing Arts Network is a program combining healing therapies and the arts to help patients discover inner resources to deal with illness.

Similar Pink Ribbon programs have been established in Atlanta, Cincinnati, Camp LeJeune and New York.
